won't see play at any but nationally-rated events, because it is surely Mid-Chart, and not suitable for, for example, club play and lower bracket play at Regionals. That said, IMHO it is space-age in its design. A problem relay systems face is that the disclosed hand is sometimes declarer, leading to some contracts that are somewhat easier for opponents to defend, since the system reveals shape and placement of high cards to everyone at the table. The choice of relays in this system makes it *much* more unlikely that the describer will be declarer. That's a clear gain. Another is the idea that when the asker wants to, the asker can become the teller. That's a wonderful addition. It's usually not in the asker's best interest to keep asking if there is a void in asker's hand, or extreme shape. In addition, the full "what we can do when they interfere" possibilities are carefully elucidated. People think that the memory required to manage a relay system lies beyond them. It's not really true, again in my opinion. If you and your partner put in enough practice time, the memory required to learn the system is surprisingly not so much of an issue. There are plenty of automated dealing programs (bbo's, for example) that can help you build and tune up your skills. In addition, the series of books contains lots of useful information for people not committed to the full system. Consider the responses to 1H or 1S (generically 1M) openings. Even if you don't choose to play 1M-2C as a game forcing relay sequence, you can play it as GF artificial and get on with the benefits of the other parts of the response structure. Or what about the weak 2 bid possibilities? Consider those, since they could fit right into your current arsenal. There is plenty to think about in these books. My partner and I are working on incorporating parts of the system into our (already relay Precision) context. Bravo, Grans.
