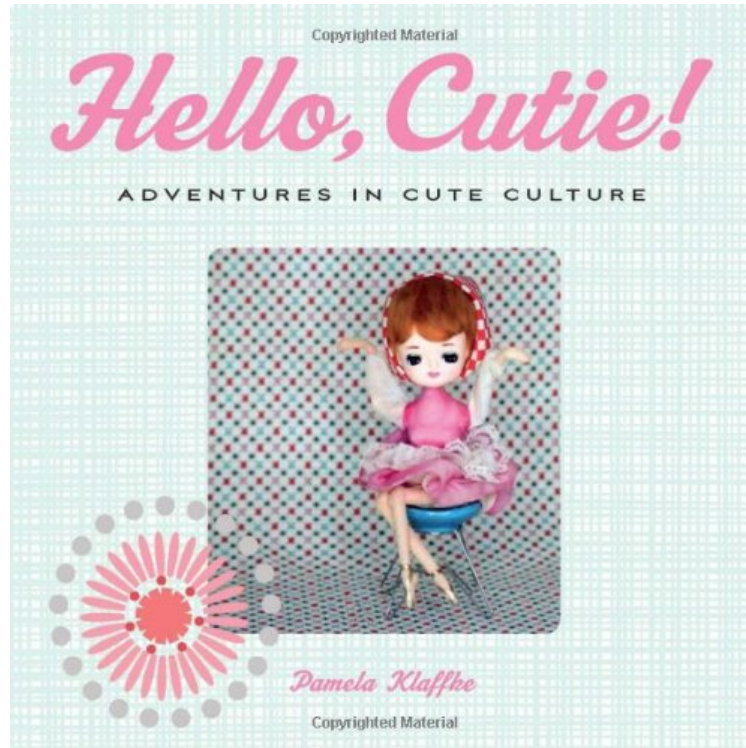

Judging by the sample, it appeared to cover a whole range of cute cultures but the book itself is very, very heavily focused on modern Japanese cute - and there is way too much repetitiveness about the Blythe doll. Based on what the author confesses she loves (and which I identified with) I was expecting more of a range and a lot more retro - ie cute jewellery (as in 1950s-1960s animal brooches), animal ornaments, cute bric a brac - that kind of thing. About a third of the book references and/or promotes makers of hand made cute items, links to their website or sites where you can buy their stuff - which I found a bit boring - and she could have done with editing out a lot of the stuff about her daughter. I feel I know her daughter's likes and dislikes better than the author's - and I personally am not interested in a child's opinions on such a niche topic. It could have done with a good sharp edit and a lot more photos.
