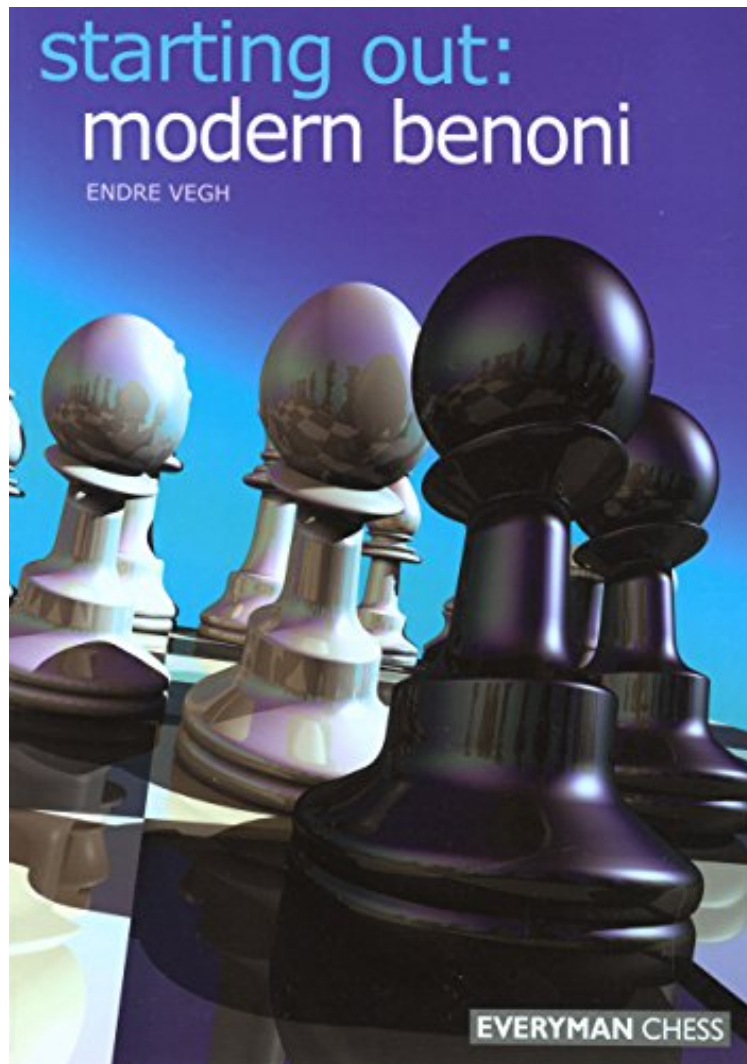

Last but not least, it covers the modern benoni from both the white and black point of view, which comes in handy if you take both sides of the benoni. Fine book, but too partisan. By WBSI find this book quite instructive, and I especially appreciate the 55+(!) introductory pages devoted to typical and thematic positions and what to do if you're playing either side. If you're like me and typically digest only a small percentage of any chess book you buy, this is definitely the section to concentrate on. My lowly three-star rating should not be interpreted as denigrating the book's fine analysis and explanations -- it reflects instead my exasperation with IM Vegh's adoption of what I call the "boppy anglo-american chessbook style." (I do realize that Vegh is Hungarian.) This style apparently relies on the assumption that any buyer wants to adopt the opening as their main weapon -- not that they might want to learn about it from the other side (in my case, the white pieces' side) so as to complete their (1. d4) opening knowledge. I want objective explanations and really don't need to hear how winning and/or playable the benoni is for Black no matter what variation White chooses. As we all know, if any opening were really winning for one side or the other, it would no longer be played! I just want to learn the typical imbalances resulting from each variation of a particular opening, and how the best players have dealt with them. IM Vegh's partisan approach starkly contrasts with the more neutral approach adopted by many fine authors including those of Everyman's sister book "Starting out: Benoni Systems" as well as such other great authors as Iakov Neishtadt and John Nunn. 3 of 27 people found the following review helpful. Allowing Black to create a drastic position imbalance from the beginning, it offers the chance for great advances but requires that both players press ahead boldly as to hesitate where the Modern Benoni is involved is sure to inspire disaster. Illustrating its points and examples with sample games and chessboard diagrams, Starting Out: Modern Benoni is an excellent self-teaching tool and a highly recommended resource for avid chess players of intermediate to advanced skill level.
