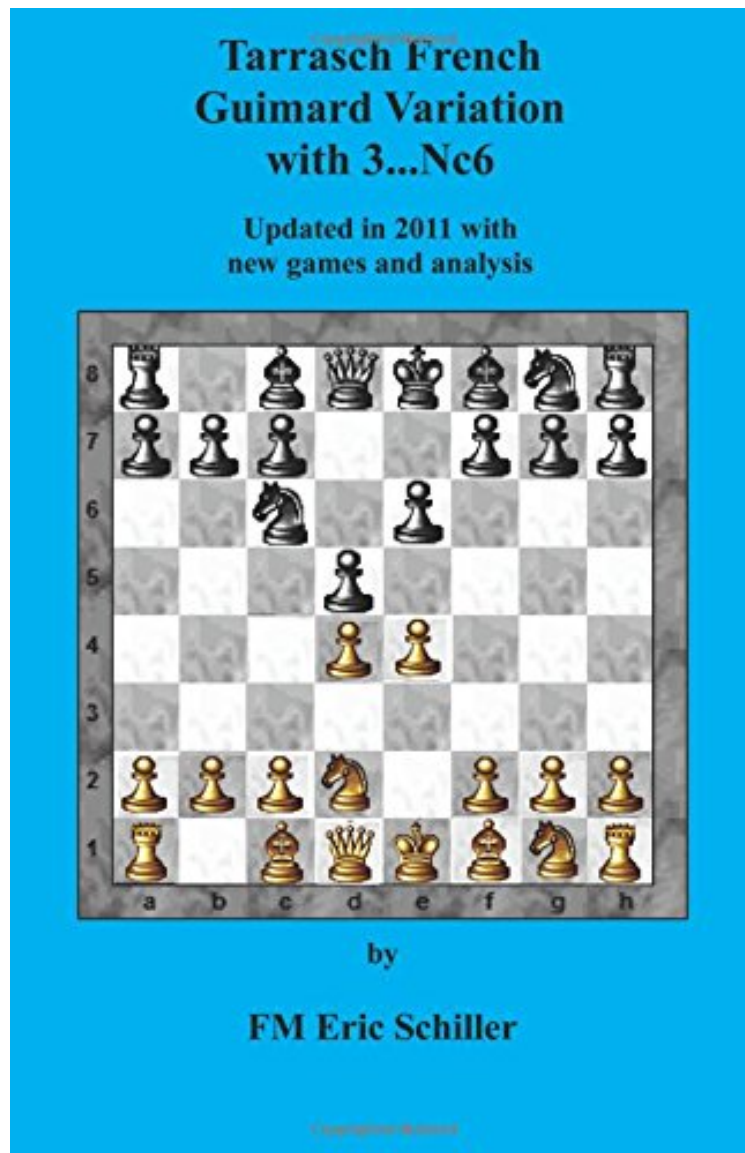

From the almost unreadable diagrams which use the icons which were most popular in books published in the 1930's to the mismatched font to the unbroken walls of text that fill every page (and every page is made of the cheapest, lowest quality paper you'd ever find attached to a book binder), you'll find the process of reading it thoroughly unenjoyable, and every page brings it's own special brand of unpleasantness. I can't imagine what the editors were thinking. If you're able to get over that, and there's no guarantee that you'll be able to get over that, you'll find that the work which has gone into the analysis is really pretty impressive. They cover all the relevant material in a logical manner, illustrating each point with ample complete games. The games themselves are only lightly annotated, and I'd have problems recommending this book for anyone below 1800 rating (Mine is in the high 2200s), but for it's intended market, it's a really valuable resource. Really, your call. You can learn a lot from this book about the French Guimard. You'll also learn what not to do if you ever want to publish a chess book. If you're into substance over style, go ahead and slap down your \$20. Just be aware that, however bad you think the style is now, having read this review, it's actually worse.

The popularity of the French Defense has surged to the point where it rivals the Sicilian and the Spanish in the chess international tournament arenas. Always known for its solid character, the French offers Black excellent winning chances in the main lines of the Winawer and in many side variations. But what of the Tarrasch Variation, 3. Nd2. Here the play often takes a quiet or positional character. The Argentine Chess Champion Carlos Guimard has developed a system based on an early 3. Nc6 by Black, due to the cramped forecourt of the white pieces and with the plan of an early e5 or f6. This leads to exciting play. This is the only book devoted entirely to this important system.

About the Author Eric Schiller is an American chess player, trainer, arbiter and one of the most prolific authors of books on chess in the 20th century. Schiller was arbiter for the Kasparov-Kramnik World Chess Championship match in 2000. He has often been a news reporter, reporting on Chess Olympiads and World Chess Championship matches. Schiller was the arbiter for the Staunton Memorial tournament in London in 2005, 2007 and 2008. Schiller has written over 100 chess books, more than any other author of the genre in the 20th century except Fred Reinfeld and Raymond Keene.
